MERCER AND FONT HILL MUSEUMS TOUR



With wintery March weather behind us, and spring-like April following in its footsteps, it was a perfect day for our tour.

Entering the Mercer Museum's main room, our attention was immediately drawn to the whaling boat and Conestoga wagon, two large artifacts hanging from the sides of the room. From ground floor to ceiling, six floors of displays, and exhibits highlight the artifacts and usage of early Americana. Walking from level to level new insight was offered to many early American trades as we could examine the items more closely as well as an appreciation and awe of the amateur-made reinforced structure Chapman was able to construct to house his collection. A collection that is a true testament to Mercer's vision to preserve the past so future generations can learn about the historical tools of yesterday's trades.

After lunch the guided tour of Fonhill (Henry Mercer's home) offered insight into Mercer's many accomplishments as an archaeologist, architect, author, and tile maker. Like his other buildings, Fonhill was constructed with concrete by a work crew and a horse named Lucky. Within his home, Mercer added his own unique touches by incorporating his tile collection, the tile he made and many prints throughout Fonhill.

As previously mentioned, Henry Ford considered the Mercer Museum containing early American artifacts as the only American museum worthwhile seeing and wanted to purchase the collection, Mercer had no interest in selling.

As for the automobile Mercer did not own one, he thought the exhaust was bad for the trees. His primary mode of transportation around Doylestown was a bike. If needed to go long distances he relied on his right-hand man Frank Swain, it was said he owned a Ford.

A visionary of his time, Mercer ensured history would forever be preserved by collection and storing his collection for the education and enjoyment of future generations. If you missed our tour, the Museums are open daily with a new exhibit "Racing: A Need For Speed" opening May 12th at the Mercer Museum.

Thank you for your recent donation of \$250.00 on behalf of Frank Kemp. He was a special person who loved collecting and sharing his knowledge of automotive history.


