#### <u>TRIBUTE TO DON BOUGHER</u>

"Pontiaction" Editor Dick Stover asked me to put pen to paper and write about POCI founder Don Bougher, who passed away on November 22 nd . I am honored to do so. I first met Don and Pat in October 1973 at my former restaurant "Don's Pizza" in Camp Hill, PA. They flew in from their home in California to attend the "Pontiac Owners Club" first tribal gathering as it was called for the club. It was held the Sunday after the Hershey Fall meet and was a one day only car show and flea market. I believe we had 50 + or - Pontiacs and a couple of vendors including co-founder # 2, Joe Oliver in attendance.

I arranged to have the Plexiglas 1940 Pontiac "Ghost" car there and purchased it that day. Don told me that if I did not buy it, he would. I have a picture of us standing by the car on the flatbed trailer at the show.

Don was the clubs founder and held all positions except Secretary (Joe Oliver) in the beginning, including the clubs first Editor. He wore many hats and wore them well. Our path's crossed many times at conventions. I particularly remember "80's The Date, for the Keystone State", our 1980 Gettysburg convention where I served as co-chair with the late Roland Dunkleberger and Bob Nauman. I also served as National President then and I remember our Board meeting running well into the night.

Don and Pat and my wife Carol (she passed away on November 20th, 2018) and I went to a local diner to have dinner. Our 3 children (10, 7, and 4) were with us. Needless to say they were not perfect angels and since Pat and Don had no children, we felt embarrassed at times. Many years later we still laughed about that dinner.

The last time that our path's crossed was at the 2002 West Virginia convention. I remember chatting under the bridge where the flea market was held and catching up on old times past.

There were good and bad times. When the Directors Emeritus was unceremoniously eliminated from the club under a now deceased past President, it was a hard pill, especially for Don to swallow. He founded and nurtured the club and was hurt (as we all were) by this action. Fortunately, as time marched on, we were reinstated and Don was tasked with calling the rest of the Directors Emeritus to let them know we were no longer excommunicated.

When the Keystone State Chapter hosted the 2019 convention in Gettysburg where we celebrated POCI's history, Don, due to health issues was not able to attend. He was missed but contributed much information to Ralph Keller, including the original 1926 radiator, for our hotel lobby display. His 1926 Pontiac (sold many years ago) was on display in the hotel lobby. Few people are fortunate to leave a lasting legacy. The founding of POCI by Don Bougher in 1972 will be remembered as long as the club exists.

#### Winter storage for my tin Indians - It's about the details

I have a drill that I've been doing for years. It has seemed to work so I've tried to stick with it. It's a sequence that both my 65 GTO and 62 Grand Prix receive and I keep an index card under the wiper blade with the check list - basically so that I know the date and fact that each item was completed/performed.

The following items are addressed with the goal that everything will be trouble free in the spring:

- 1) coolant- both level temperature that it is good to and age/color changed if it is required
- 2) lube/oil w/ zinc and filter

3) fresh non-ethanol premium fuel and Marine grade Stabil

4) tire inflation (every tire loses 5 pounds over the course of the year) - I check each and inflate to 32 or about that

5) I vacuum the car and polish and wax every-

thing - including any interior surfaces - chrome

door handles/console etc.

6) any other fluid levels

7) battery disconnected and placed on a battery tender

8) the car is covered

#### Ideas for prepping your collector vehicle for Winter

Winters in Pennsylvania can be rough on antique and classic vehicles. The snow and ice can take its toll, but worse than that is the salt, <u>brine</u> and cinders they use to keep the roads clear. So many of us have a ritual that we perform to put our cars away for the winter. Here are some of the ideas that I have heard about over the years. The list might vary depending on your storage area.

- 1. Make sure you change your engine oil and filter.
- 2. Check your anti-freeze protection level and quality (age).
- 3. Fill (but don't overfill) your fuel tank to prevent condensation and add fuel stabilizer. Then run the car so the stabilizer gets through the whole system.
- 4. Check the tire air pressure. I like to set mine for 32 psi.
- 5. If you have electricity available, disconnect the battery and connect it to a battery tender. If you don't have electricity or heat, you may wish to remove your battery to store inside where it will not freeze.
- 6. Go through your interior and trunk to clean out any items that you don't want to store there for the winter.
- 7. Sweep and clean the interior and add a protectant to any leather or vinyl surfaces. Waxing the interior chrome is also a good idea. You can also add a box of baking soda or desiccant to the interior and trunk to help keep odors and humidity at bay.
- 8. Cover the tailpipe and air cleaner intake to prevent rodents from getting in.
- 9. For interior protection from rodents' place dryer sheets at different locations inside the car and around the tires to prevent access to the car
- 10. A fresh coat of wax before you cover your car can help prevent scratches as you cover and uncover the vehicle.

Throughout the winter, I try to drive my car if the roads are clear, <u>dry</u> and salt free. It's not good to just start your car and shut it off without completely heating up the engine, transmission, and exhaust system. You don't want to leave any condensation in any of those systems.

### Preparing Cars for Winter Storage

As fall has just turned to winter, I know that many of us will pull our cars into the garage and store them until spring comes. While I am sure each of us has a routine in preparing our cars for storage, our editor suggested that I share my approach. Perhaps other members can get some ideas, or you can share with me something I do not do but would benefit from doing. Anyway, here is how I do it.

**Oil Change** – I like to change the oil and oil filter. This removes any oil with unwanted deposits and makes it ready to start up in the spring.

**Gas** – I am a religious user of gas additive to prevent deterioration of the fuel. I put a stabilizer in the gas tank every time I put gas in my cars. <u>Actually, I</u> use two additives. When I put the cars away for the winter, I give each gas tank a shot of stabilizer for good measure. It's cheap insurance.

**Other Fluids** – I check and bring up to "full" all other under hood fluids namely coolant (50/50 mixture), power steering fluid and master cylinder fluid. The latter is particularly important because if you are using standard brake fluid, it tends to evaporate over the winter, and you don't want the cylinder to run dry. It is also a "must check first "in the spring.

**Battery** – You need to do something to keep the battery charged and not let it run down. Many folks use trickle chargers and are happy with that approach. I have had two incidences of batteries exploding because of overcharging and, as a result, have given up on trickle chargers. My approach is to use an inexpensive fast charger and about once every six weeks or so, I just charge each battery individually. It gets the job done and does not leave four trickle chargers running in the garage.

**Tires** – This is a subject with much controversary – should you take the weight <u>off of</u> your tires by jacking up the car? Since I run radials on all my cars, I have decided that it is not worth the effort to elevate the cars. However, if I were running conventional bias ply tires, I would absolutely jack the car(s) up for that long a period.

**Grease Fittings** – It is not critical to grease such fittings for storage. I do it as part of the oil changes sequence and then do not have to do it in spring.

**Interior** – I like to be sure the interior of the vehicle is vacuumed out from any dust and dirt gotten in the summer driving season. But, MOST IMPORTANTLY, if you have a garage if even on rare occasions is visited by mice or other rodents, you should fill a plastic egg carton with moth balls and <u>put</u> on the floor of the vehicle. The stink of moth balls is a highly effective deterrent and will keep them out. Nevertheless, I also use some form of mouse traps and scatter them around the garage (see manufacturer recommendations for placement and use).
